Year 11 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation—Caving Excursion


The Year 11 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation students recently spent time in the Boranup Forest scrambling through a series of restricted access caves. Prior to spending the day 'spelunking', the students spent time in classes learning about; how the LN Ridge was formed, the mechanisms through which caves are formed, different speleothems (cave formations) and how they are formed, flora and fauna specific to caves in this region and how to minimise their impact whilst visiting the caves.

The Year 11 students were given the opportunity to explore Nannup Cave, well known for its high level of cave decoration and Dingo Cave, regarded as the most adventurous restricted cave in the area incorporating an abseil entry down a solution pipe and plenty of squeezes through tight spaces.

Many thanks again to Mick Dempsey of the Margaret River Climbing Co., whose presence allowed two caving instructors on site, maximising the experience for all students involved.


Year 12 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation—Roping Assessment Excursion

On Thursday 11th May, the Year 12 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation students travelled to the spectacular Wilyabrup Sea Cliffs.

Students were not only given the opportunity to attempt a number of climbs and abseils but more importantly, were responsible for operating all belays (safety lines) ensuring each others' well-being. The students showed both maturity and competence operating a top-line belay with Gri Gri devices for the climbs and with ATC devices for the abseil.

These excursions enable the students to address not only the roping specific Units of Competency; **Demonstrate abseiling skills on natural surfaces** and **Safeguard an abseiler using a single rope belay system** but also a number of other Units of Competency assessed over the 2 year course such as **Minimising environmental impact** and **Assist in conducting outdoor recreation sessions**.

Many thanks to Mick Dempsey of the Margaret River Climbing Co. and Sue Buckland for making the day possible, providing the opportunity to run a number of activities concurrently.



Year 9 Abseling/Climbing Excursion

On Thursday 1st and Friday 2nd of June, the Semester 1 Year 9 Roping classes travelled to Wilyabrup Sea Cliffs to put abseiling and safety belaying skills developed in class to the test in a natural and challenging environment.

A series of four climbs (ranging in difficulty and climbing techniques required) and two abseils (one with a top-line belay and the other with an active bottom brake) were rigged and manned by qualified instructors affording the students many opportunities over the course of the day.

We were blessed with amazingly sunny days and a rising swell in the adjacent ocean; the conditions could not have been better for the first two official days of winter.

The students displayed very good skills and safety awareness and practices ensuring a rewarding experience for all, both students and instructors.

Special thanks to Mick Dempsey of the Margaret River Climbing Co. for lending us his expertise on the day. We are very fortunate as school to have been able to draw on his services for many years and look forward to continuing this into the future.



Year 11 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation First Aid

Year 11 students in the Certificate II Outdoor Recreation courses recently participated in and completed their Provide First Aid (formerly Senior First Aid) qualification.

The Two 2-day Course teaches the skills and knowledge required to treat and manage various injuries and illness in a community or workplace setting until the emergency services arrive. The course was conducted at MREC at no cost to the students; which allowed the students to complete the core unit of competency 'Provide First Aid' and attain a certificate valid for three years from the date of the course. Special mention must go to St John Instructor Maxine Metcalfe for delivering the courses in an informative and engaging way. The students genuinely enjoyed the experience.




Timber bonus for Woodwork Centre

(currently on a years leave) coordinated the project and worked closely once again with the very generous Peter Moorfoot and his Lewis Mill to break down the timber into a large quantity of furniture timber sizes. The "Green" timber will be strip stacked for 18-24 months to season then will be ready for students to create more fine furniture pieces. Students are currently using Jarrah and Curly Blackbutt timber milled by the Thwaites/ Moorfoot milling team almost three years ago.



Peter cutting from the premium Jarrah log




Farm News

Jane spoke to an intimate group of students from 14 schools across the state to promote her Roots and Shoots program.



THE BOOK OF KELLS

The Year 9 Art students have been inspired by the new library resource 'The Book of Kells'. Their drawings and Lino print designs have been inspired by the illustrations of this amazing book.







BOTTLING WINE

To develop greener Art practices in our facility, we haven been exploring Kitchen Lithography, a technique invented by French artist Émilion. This is a simple and non-toxic technique that utilises household materials to make lithographic prints. Aluminium foil is etched with cola to create plates capable of multiple prints.

Local artist Anita Haywood, Art teacher Caroline Juniper and prac teacher Ashley Island accepted the invitation from Kate Marzohl-Duffy to explore this exciting process.

Our students will soon benefit form the results of this workshop as they will utilise this technique in the lower school fine art and upper school certificate III course.



YEAR 10 CERAMICS

Year 10 Ceramics students have been introduced to the pottery wheel and are "throwing" pots. "Throwing" is a pottery term used to describe the process of shaping the clay on the potter's wheel.

The students are learning introductory skills, throwing, turning, firing and glazing their pots. They are currently using white earthen ware and terracotta clay. They are looking forward to the kiln opening to see if they passed their trial by fire.

PERFECT LANGUAGES, SIMPLY PERFECT

The Margaret River SHS Languages students recently competed in the worldwide Language Perfect World Championship competition.

Language Perfect is an online language learning program that allows students to study, practice and self-assess language structures and vocabulary.

The Language Perfect World Championship is a ten-day opportunity for students worldwide to compete in language learning. The students are required to complete listening, reading or writing tasks and earn points for accurate completion of these tasks. There are about 400,000 students competing globally from 1640 schools.

The three languages teachers are all native speakers: Angela McCoy, Patrick Marzohl and Marian Grapes. Two of these teachers are Level 3 classroom teachers with advanced teaching skills.

Margaret River Senior High School is the only country high school that offers 6 language choices to students: Indonesian, Chinese, German, French, Italian and Spanish.

The Languages classroom are equipped with laptop and iPads to facilitate online Language learning programs and global online exchange.

- ✓ achieved TOP SCHOOL status in Western Australia for like schools in German, French and Spanish, and runner-up in Italian
- achieved a runner-up medal in German for like schools in Australia (only beaten by School for German Language, Adelaide)



EQUESTRIAN—WA STATE TEAM SELECTION!!!

Jessica Ridley in Yr 8 and her pony Diamond Dream Flying Spirit (better known to his friends as Jack) have been selected to represent Western Australia at the **2017 Australian Interschool Equestrian Championships** in the discipline of Secondary Show Hunter and Intermediate Preliminary Dressage. The Australian Interschool Championships attracts more than 2000 school based competitors, family, friends and supporters from around the country.

This year the event will take place at Toowoomba, Queensland from Monday 25^{th} to Friday 29^{th} September 2017. Jessica will be competing in the Preliminary Dressage competition and Secondary Show Hunter class which has three phases that they are judged in.

Phase one is an In-Hand competition to determine the most correct horse/pony and the ringcraft demonstrated by the handler. Phase two is the Rider Class where the rider is judged on their rider position and application of the correct aids in an efficient and elegant manner. Phase three is the Show Hunter class where the horse is judged on its correct conformation, paces and faultless education.

Due to the transporting distance and that Queensland has the deadly Hendra virus Jessica won't be taking Jack to Queensland but will ride a pool horse. Pool horses are supplied by Queensland members of Equestrian Australia for riders from WA, NT and TAS to compete on. All other states will be transporting their own horses to the competition.

Around 183 million batteries (8,000 tonnes) are disposed to landfill each year, and this represents a loss of valuable, non-renewable resources.

Used batteries should be recovered to conserve valuable metals and to reduce environmental impacts in landfill. The most toxic batteries are those that contain mercuric oxide, nickel cadmium and lead. Batteries are sorted by chemistry and then transported to recyclers here and overseas.

Water Wise School



This Year, MRSHS is planning to become an accredited WATER WISE School. This is an initiative encouraged by the Water Corporation of WA. The Water Wise Schools Program has been successfully implanted in over 560 schools across the State. The Program provides an opportunity for students to develop practical knowledge of water issues, make informed decisions and become advocates for responsible water use behaviours.

As part of our commitment to this program we have set up a display in the science foyer to show student's and staff what you cannot down the toilet. Each month we will place a new tip in the

newsletter. The display will be added to each week, so pop in more than once.



Keep rubbish out of our wastewater system

Everything you pour down the kitchen sink or any item you put down the toilet doesn't just disappear. It goes through the wastewater system to a treatment plant where it is processed to ensure it can be either reused or disposed of in an environmentally friendly manner.

There are many everyday items that should not enter the wastewater system. Disposing of household waste correctly prevents damage to the wastewater system and helps protect the environment.

Some effects of placing items down the toilet:

- they can clog the wastewater system and treatment plant
- machinery can break down
- people must manually clear the filters which can be dangerous overflows can occur which harm the environment and be expensive to repair for both Water Corporation and for householders, particularly if the blockage or overflow is on your property.

How to dispose of common household items:

- Cooking fats and oils can be poured into a container and binned.
- Chemicals should be given to a licensed hazardous wastes contractor or c contact your local council.
- Food scraps can be placed in the bin or compost.
- Newspaper and plastics can be recycled. Contact your local council for more information.
- Unused medicines can be returned to pharmacies.
- Engine oils can be taken to local garages or oil recycling centres.
- Nappies, razors, cotton buds, syringes must be wrapped up and placed in a bin.




