PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

The way in which students finish off the last weeks of a course can often determine their final grade. I

The Margaret River Senior High School Surf Team has once again claimed the regional championship and will head up to Perth to defend our state title. I would like to congratulate all students who participated and represented our school and acknowledge the fantastic efforts of Surf Academy Coordinator Mr John McTaggart who has worked closely with our Surf Academy students this year. This is a tremendous effort by our students and demonstrates the level of excellence that the Margaret River Senior High School Surf Academy is providing.

Our Year 10 to 11 counselling team is currently meeting with parents and students in relation to their subject selections for 2018. I would like to thank all the parents for their support and attendance at interviews at this very important time for our students. I would like to congratulate Michelle Miller, Matthew Johnston and Miss Emma Dziadulewicz for their work in the Year 10 Career IT classes as students have come to their interviews extremely well prepared.

There have been recent concerns expressed in relation to the Year 12 Leaver's jacket. I Initially made the decision that the 2018 jacket would not have a hood to fit in with the rest of our School Uniform Policy. After being asked to review the decision, I discussed the matter with the school's Senior Leadership Group, the School Parents and Citizens Committee and the School Board. These major decision making bodies have decided that students would be able to have an exemption to the school uniform policy and include a hood in the design of their jackets.

I would like to add that at no stage has social media comment or petitions have had any bearing on the formal decision making process at Margaret River SHS, or will have in the future.

The school's Evacuation Plan has been included as part of this newsletter, to give parents an understanding of the procedure that takes place if there is an emergency onsite.

Finally, the school tour to China has just been approved by the Department of Education. This will be the second visit to N.O 1 Middle School in Haining, which is our sister school, as well as other cultural areas in China. I look forward to attending with Mr Keen, Mrs McCoy, Mr Smith and the students who have chosen to be part of this exciting Tour.

Financial Information

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Thank you to those that have already paid in full their Contribution & Charges or have made contact with me to set up a payment plan. If you haven't done so please feel free to contact me via email <u>Cristina.oliveira@education.wa.edu.au</u> to set this up.

The school recognises that the socio-economic background of many families requires special consideration. Financial consideration will be given to those families in genuine need; however, families also need to recognise that there are considerable constraints in operating a school.

The school's costing structure and tight budget relies heavily on prompt payment of school Voluntary Contributions and Charges. Prompt payment also minimises administration time and costs involved in following up outstanding charges.

Where a student's current year compulsory charges have not been paid in full, the School Board has endorsed a 50% confirmation charge for extra cost optional components for the following year. Parents/guardians are encouraged to make contact with the school's Business Manager if they are experiencing difficulties paying Voluntary Contributions and Charges by the due date. The Manager Corporate Services has the discretion to negotiate and recommend a payment arrangement that is suitable to both the family and the school. A payment arrangement, once established, will be expected to be adhered to.

Where parents/guardians fail to respond to communication from the school and/or will not come to an arrangement on the payment, a Collection Agency may be engaged to recover outstanding charge.

Margaret River SHS Student Study the Science of Water

Students from Margaret River Senior High School were immersed in water and technology as part of their science studies late last term.

Water Corporation visited 130 Year 7 science students, setting up an experiment to measure how much water is held in underground aquifers and constructing a schematic diagram of the town water supply scheme.

Water Corporation South West Regional Manager, John Janssen, said the activities linked to the Waterwise Schools Program, with students studying water as part of their Science, Mathematics and sustainability learning activities.

"In our drying climate, it is vital the next generation are waterwise and understand why a sustainable water supply benefits our cities and towns." Mr Janssen said.

He explained where Margaret River's water supply comes from and showed the students how a water supply engineer would use hydrogeological information to calculate the amount of water held in an aquifer.

Most of the students were surprised to learn that Margaret River has two water sources – groundwater and surface water - and that Water Corporation is already

planning 50 years ahead to ensure the town has a secure water supply in our drying climate.



Did you know?

- In 2015-16, Water Corporation supplied nearly 1.7 billion litres of drinking water to its customers in Margaret River.
- The average household in Margaret River water used about 222,000 litres in 2015-16.
- About 950 million litres of recycled water was used to irrigate a woodlot and public open space in Margaret River in 2015-16.

HASS & LANGUAGES NEWS

HASS—The Years 7 & 8 HASS students currently engage with government and law topics. In a simulation game activity, they have identified the distinct characteristics of legislative, executive and judicative powers. The Year 7 classes then debated the Australian constitution while the Year 8's looked at active participation in civics. The students identified core values of being Australian, then formulated a petition, sought support for their initiative from peers and wrote a letter to a local member of government. Both year groups finish the civics and citizenship course with an introduction in law studies.

Meanwhile, the Year 9 HASS students completed an online historical inquiry into historical developments 1750 to 1918. In a peer marking exercise, the students evaluated text structures and argument formulation. Their first historical case study about the Industrial Revolution has now commenced. The students will complete this investigation with a museum's display on selected topics of the industrial age.



Titration Stakes

Margaret River Senior High School sent an inaugural team of Year 12 Chemistry students to Perth for the annual Titration Stakes Competition.

The competition involves using an acid (Hydrochloric Acid) to neutralize a base (Sodium Hydroxide) and to then work out the concentration of the base.

Using the base the students then neutralised three different samples of vinegar (Acetic Acid) and worked out the concentration of each sample.

The accuracy needed is very tight, no more than 4 drops can separate each result; steady hands and strong nerve is needed.

The students Zoe Chandler, L'adriel Hackett and Annabelle Jones did an amazing job. They left school at 1pm on Tuesday and didn't return until midnight and yes, they all made it to school on Wednesday. Their dedication is impressive.

The competition is not usually attended by country schools due to the timing of it 5pm – 8pm.

There were 69 teams participating, mainly from Perth's prestigious private school with a handful of state schools, it was a big event and a fabulous opportunity for our students.

We didn't make the top 10 but it was a valiant effort by our students and will now become an annual event for MRSHS Chemistry Students.

It's never been more challenging for parents to raise happy, healthy and resilient children.



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

What is YourTutor?

It's online, one-to-one help for students in years 3-12 with homework and study questions, a free service offered by the Shire of Augusta Margaret River libraries.

Students can get help with questions in maths, writing, English, science and more, by connecting to a network of qualified subject experts on-demand, or by uploading a written file any time for feedback within 24 hours

The YourTutor 'online classroom' includes a typed chat with a live tutor, an interactive whiteboard where you can draw with the tutor, and the ability to share links and files for review.


