## **Margaret River Mobile Dental Van**

Margaret River Dental Mobile is currently located at Margaret River Primary School corner of Forest Road and Bussell Highway. Children are eligible for the School Dental Service from the year they turn 5 until their 17<sup>th</sup> birthday or end of year 11 (whichever comes first) this is a free service. The school dental school is not a compulsory service and all children can attend their family/ private practice if they prefer to.

Due to over whelming student numbers in Margaret River there is a waiting list for all enrolled children. Margaret River dental mobile along with the private dental practices in Margaret River can utilise the Child Dental Benefits Schedule, this federal government incentive allows \$1000 of dental treatment over a 2 year period from age of 2 till 18 years of age. If you are currently seeking treatment with your private/



family dentist and don't wish to continue with the School Dental Service can you please email MargaretRiverMobile@dental.health.wa.gov.au to consent withdraw. This will allow another child waiting on the waiting list to be seen sooner.

Any parents who wish to consent withdraw can enter back into the service, while they are still eligible, at any time. In 2018 Rapids Landing Primary School will be opening and there will be a fixed dental clinic attached to the administration building. At this stage we are unable to confirm a date when the clinic will be up and running. Until then, all patients will continue to be seen at the dental van and will keep everyone updated for when the new clinic opens.

Eighty Year Nine students from Drama and English were selected to see this performance as part of our school's Engagement and Enrichment program. The show offered students a plot synopsis of the F.Scott Fitzgerald novel "The Great Gatsby". It covered biographical details about the famous novelist and insights into 1920s America – all with song, mime, gender swaps, audience involvement and hilarity.

The Australian Playhouse are a yearly touring company to our school – next year they will perform "Shakespeare: As You Write It" to help students appreciate the conventions of Shakespearian Theatre.

## Term 3 Science: Fish and Chicks, Bits and Bobs and Farewell...

Term 3 was a very busy term in science. 34 Degrees Down South Fish supplies kindly donated two large tubs of fish frames for the Yr. 8 students to have a close look at gills and eyes. Students carefully dissected the gills out of the fish skeleton, and then floated them in a beaker of fresh water to fully demonstrate the amazing surface area this organ provides for the fish.

We also had a visiting teacher from the Woodside Australian Science Project. Ms Julia Ferguson took 3 classes over 2 days, from different years, to show them different aspects of Earth Sciences. One of the classes, Ms West's Year 10 class, were given the opportunity to look closely at artefacts collected by Ms Ferguson from the goldfields; artefacts that have been left by miners over a century ago. Students were given hand lenses to closely examine and then try to work out what each artefact was and what distinguishing features the items had. There was old cigar tins, medicine bottles, some aboriginal artefacts and many more. The class provided these students with many skills that they can now take to other aspects of science as well.

We had some births in Science as well this term. An incubator holding fertilised eggs was placed in the foyer a couple of days before hatching. Lucky students were able to witness chicks actually hatching out of their shell, and after a few days were permitted to hold and weigh the chicks. We placed a chart near the chick enclosure, and recorded weights 3 times a week. Wow those chicks grow fast! Students that came to hold the chicks learnt about the lifecycle of a chick and how the embryo develops in the egg, as well as the need for strict thermo regulation during the first few weeks of a chick's life, especially important if they are not with their mother. We will hatch another batch of chicks later in the year.

The Year 12 ATAR students finished their classes this week; its always hard to capture them in photos in science but I found a few from earlier in the year from Human Biology Class testing each other body temperature when exposed to different extreme Temperatures. One doused herself in ice buckets, wet towels and air-conditioning, another clothed himself in ski gear and we put the heating on full.

To all the Year 12 Science students, farewell, good luck and thankyou for being such wonderful, keen, enquiring and enthusiastic young people. Best of luck in your exams, and future and may Science be with you always.

Question: Why is a physics book always unhappy? Answer: Because it always has lots of problems!!!!

Physics was the name of the game and 'May the Force be with you' was the topic studied. Year 7's delved into the world of Albert Einstein and his three laws of motion. Forces were explored and measured; crash dummies proved the importance of seatbelts and the girls beat the boys at tug of war (of course). Students learnt about Leonardo Da Vinci's inventions and came up with

inventions of their own that would prove useful in the future.

STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) challenges included building and launching marshmallow catapults, as well as working in teams to build a Rube Goldberg machine, a deliberately complex contraption in which a series of devices that perform simple tasks are linked together to produce a domino effect in which activating one device triggers the next device in the sequence.

From the photos it's clear to see that everyone had a great time researching, designing and constructing their contraptions. A pretty fun time was had by all, which was wonderful to see. Thank you to all the students for their energy and creativity, and to the parents who allowed their son or daughter to bring in materials from home.

At the end of Term 3, MRSHS was officially named a Waterwise school. There are over 500 waterwise schools in the state but only about 15 percent are High Schools. Waterwise schools become education role models for the community.

Each Newsletter, we will endeavour to put some tips in for you at home to save water too...

We have formed a waterworks committee at the school which has enlisted 2 students from each Year 7-10, staff members and School Principal, Andrew Host. I am very proud to be able to work with such keen and enquiring students.

We will have monthly meetings to discuss ways to save water in the school and over the next few weeks are conducting a full school water audit where the students are checking for leaks, faulty bubblers and toilets and measuring flow rates of all these water outlets. They are also taking two daily school water meter readings for 2 weeks. We plan to collate all our findings and correlate them with the school water bills and current usage and then make recommendations to the School Board on ways that we can cut down on water use.

#### Tips for November

- Dishwashers typically use less water than washing dishes by hand. Now, Energy Star dishwashers save even more water and energy.

## Year 11/12 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation Hiking Expeditions

On Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> to Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> October and Tuesday 31<sup>st</sup> October to Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> November, all Year 11 and some Year 12 Outdoor Recreation students undertook the annual Certificate II in Outdoor Recreation expeditions. The expedition covered a total distance of 52km over the 3 days, comprising of Margaret River Mouth to Contos Campground Day 1 (21km), Contos Campground to Hamelin Bay Day 2 (22km) and Hamelin Bay to Cosy Corner (9km).

The expedition serves as a vital tool to complete a number of assessments ranging from observations of performance with respect to hiking, campcraft, navigation and leadership, to completion of an expedition logbook, which displays the students' planning prior to departure. In pairs, the students took turns at leading the group in navigation stages over the three days. This involved giving the group a navigation briefing, navigating and leading the group, staying aware of group spread, well-being, hydration and needs.

It must be remembered that at all times students had a backpack (approximatelyt 15kg) on their back containing all their food, cooking equipment, clothes, sleeping bag, fluids, personal needs etc;.....everything required to survive the three days.

The weather gods smiled on us with the students staying dry at all times; the only episode of rain early on day 3 with the first group.

Overall the group put in an excellent performance, remaining positive and focussed even in times of duress. The group dynamic was fantastic.

Special thanks to Brodi Read and John Andrews for their help on the respective expeditions, serving as an extra set of eyes, support vehicle driver and group hiking leader at times.



#### **OTHER HASS NEWS**

The Years 7 & 8 History classes are preparing for oral presentations and a museum's display. The Year 7 students study aspects of Ancient China, while the Year 8 students investigate Medieval Europe. #### **USKU Universal Shotokan Karate Championships**

Three Margaret River High School Students and senior fighters from the Margaret River Karate Club have been selected to represent their Dojo and State and will join the Australian karateka contingent going to Japan this month to compete in the 19th annual USKU Universal Shotokan Championships on October 13-15.

Taj Thomas and Griffin Keen (Year 10) along with Zebediah Barnett (Year 9) will travel to the Land of the Rising Sun and take on some of the world's finest warriors in fierce but friendly competition. Taj and Griffin are both 1st Dan Black Belts, while Zebediah is a short distance behind with a brown belt. The three teenagers competed at the same event two years ago, but came away empty handed after being outclassed by their formidable Japanese opponents.

Sensei Ken Rouw, who will accompany the boys, says he feels the boys have developed considerably over the past couple of years in their kata and kumite training.


The Asian Languages excursion was partly funded by MRSHS Enrichment and Engagement Program.

## **Australian Interschool Equestrian Championships**



2017 Marcus Oldham Australian Interschool Equestrian Championships were held in Toowoomba Qld on the 26-29 September. Our WA team of 32 talented riders included MRSHS student Jessica Ridley, who competed in the disciplines of Show Hunter and Dressage, at the competition.

Equestrian Queensland hosted an amazing event for 320 riders and 350 horses from all over the nation converging at the Toowoomba Showground for the four days of competition. Queensland managed to put on a heat wave just as competition started with temperatures soring to 37°c and 38°c on Jessica's competition days.

The event started with the Opening Ceremony with all of the teams marching into the arena with an array of many colours showcasing their state uniforms with pride. WA's theme was "WA on Fire" and our entry was to theme song of 'Wild Wild West' with our team looking amazing in their team uniform. The Queensland riders entered last as the hosts and very appropriately to Flo Rida's 'My House'.

Jessica rode a borrowed pool horse for the competition; Tajara Park True Spirit. Jessica was able to spend time prior to the start of competition with her pool horse family and ride Spirit to try and form a relationship with him before competition began. To give you some idea on how difficult riding a pool horse is, Jessica has been riding her pony Jack for three years forming the partnership with him to perform at their best. Jessica and Spirit had 5 rides before going to compete together against the best riders and horses from each of their states.

Jessica was the only rider on a pool horse competing in the Secondary Show Hunter class, all of the other competitors were riding their own horses. The Show Hunter class started out with the rider and horse judged in an in-hand led competition, they then moved onto the horses class where the judge is looking at the quality of the horse and it's movement and then the third phase was the rider class where Jessica was judged on her riding skills.

Jessica and Spirit placed 12<sup>th</sup> in the first phase, 13<sup>th</sup> in the second phase and 9<sup>th</sup> in the third phase giving them an overall individual placing of 13<sup>th</sup>.

Jessica's Show Horse team placed 4th Overall.

Jessica's second day of competition was in the Intermediate Preliminary Dressage completion, riding two dressage tests in the day. Dressage is all about working together as a team which Jessica and Spirit did so well all things considered. Placing 13<sup>th</sup> overall and to give you an idea how close the competition was there was only 5.096% between 1<sup>st</sup> place and Jessica at 13<sup>th</sup>.

The experience was amazing, the event brought out great sportsmanship, excellent horsemanship, the energy and camaraderie were amazing not just in the WA team but with all the other competitors from the other states, many new friends made.

The host state, Queensland, was victorious in the team event winning the prestigious Harry Le Bherz Perpetual Trophy with 2743 points. New South Wales finished second (2613 points) and Victoria was third (2197 points), WA fourth (984 points), SA fifth (568 points) and the smallest teams, the NT (222 points) and TAS (145 points) did a commendable with less than a handful of riders each.




Each program is designed to provide students who have an interest in science with an opportunity to engage in a wide range of fascinating science activities under the guidance of scientists who love their work.






