IMPORTANT INFORMAITON FOR PARENTS



Nationally Consistent Collection of Data School Students with Disability



The nationally consistent approach to data collection is currently occurring in all schools across Australia. The data collected will help to provide schools, education authorities and the community with a clear picture of the number of Australian students with disabilities receiving educational adjustments, necessary for their participation in education on the same basis as other students.

Student information collected includes:

- The student's year of schooling
- The student's category of disability (physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional)
- The student's level of adjustment (support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive adjustment).

The information supplied **will not explicitly identify individual students**. Parental notification is necessary (i.e. via newsletter), with consent no longer being a requirement. For additional information please click on the following link https://docs.education.gov.au/node/33415.

YEAR 7 EUROPEAN LANGUAGES


This term, the Year 7 European Languages students get an opportunity to learn basic German. They learn greetings like "**Guten Morgen**" and introductory statements like "**Ich heiße Herr Marzohl. Willkommen im Deutschkurs.**" A big welcome and thank you to Ms Alison Beeston for taking over from Ms Grapes as European Languages teacher in Term 3.

The Year 8 German class has practised language patterns in a very handson way. The students described their clothing in a German fashion show, talked about their favourite German breakfast food items and acted out a German cartoon story in our classroom theatre.

The German elective classes in Years 9 and 10 learn study skills using the online quizlet programme. The courses feature **German, French, Italian, Spanish, Russian, Dutch, Portuguese, Japanese, Latin** and **Noongar** language learners. The students prepare for a series of formal language competence assessments. Places will be available in the 2019 WA/La Réunion student exchange tour. TITRATION STAKES

The Annual Titration stakes are held at Curtin University each year. Schools are permitted to enter up to 2 or 3 teams of 3 students. This year MRSHS entered 2 teams of keen Yr 12 ATAR students.

Science Teacher Mr Craig Healy and Ms Lisa Chandler accompanied the students to Perth in a mini bus. After a couple of scheduled travel breaks for essentials such as playing with the footy and snacks, it was on to the high tech laboratories of Curtin University. At this point only the students are allowed entry, everyone must wear a lab coat and safety glasses at all times. The students use a wide variety of very expensive analytical equipment in order to carry out the titration procedure.

TITRATION

A **titration** is a technique where a solution of known concentration is used to determine the concentration of an unknown solution.

Titration is used in laboratory medicine to determine unknown concentrations of chemicals of interest in blood and urine. Pharmacists also use titration in the development of new pharmaceuticals.

Titration may also be used to determine the amount of a certain chemical in food.

Written by one of the students who attended the Titration stakes:

"On the 19th of June, two teams from Margaret River Senior High school competed in the annual WA titrations stakes at Curtain University, Perth. They competed against 77 other teams from various schools in order to reveal which team could most accurately calculate the concentrations of three different acetic acids. The competition lasted for almost 2 hours as teams frantically titrated chemicals numerous times and completed calculations accordingly. Afterwards, they were all supplied a large buffet tea as they eagerly anticipated the results, which were marked in less than half an hour. Neither of the teams guite matched the perfection of the winning team's accurate calculation perfect to four decimal places as one team placed a very credible 26th and the other 46th. Overall it was a challenging and fun experience for all students partaking"

CRASH TEST DUMMIES

Mr Smith's Year 7's made their own Crash Test Dummies out of plasticine and mounted them onto dynamic carts to study the effects of inertia.

YEAR 10 PHYSICAL SCIENCE

Nothing beats hands-on learning experiences. Students literally swung off the rafters to learn about the pros and cons of 1 versus 2 and 3 pulley systems. Students were surprised when they couldn't lift the weight of our petite test subject using the 1 pulley system but marvelled at how easy it was when utilising the 3 pulley system.

Such hands-on learning experiences assists our students in their understanding of subject matter which would otherwise be potentially unexciting and difficult to comprehend.



YEAR 12 BIOLOGY

Our 24-strong Biology crew were recently involved in some seriously extreme heightening and lowering of body temperature whereby three brave volunteers willingly subjected themselves to icy temperatures and three more to uncomfortably hot conditions.

With feet immersed in icy and hot water respectively, fans cranking, air conditioning or heaters on, students in acceptable near-naked dress code or overwhelmed with warm clothing and blankets, had their vital readings recorded by assisting team members every couple of minutes over a half hour duration. Group members monitored core and peripheral temperatures, heart rate and blood pressure continually and noted associated levels of distress reported by their subjects.

It's all in the name of SCIENCE – in this case, to help us understand and appreciate the incredible workings of our own body and hopefully instil an appreciation of the need to look after it!

We were fortunate to have secured the services of **Dr Ian MacLeod** who recently retired as executive director of the Western Australian Museum, to spend a day in our Science Department giving short, very entertaining and inspiring presentations to as many year groups as possible. He covered many topics relating to his career in science, including how his profession in conservation of metals and aboriginal rock art has led to his involvement in artefacts from the Batavia, the Titanic ship wrecks, attending a murder case as a key scientific witness and more.

It was great to observe the impact this had on the students, most were captured by the energy and passion that Dr Ian instils on his listeners when he talks about science, especially chemistry.

In June three lucky Yr 11 and Yr 12 students were able to listen to **Dr Karl Kruszelnicki** speak at the Readers and Writers festival held at Voyager Estate, Margaret River. He gave a very entertaining and intellectual presentation. After which, the students were welcomed to his signing table. In the near future, we hope to organise a free live skype session with Dr Karl where students can participate in a Q & A session.

EGG BEFORE THE CHICKEN

Towards the end of Term 2, we brought in an incubator with fertile chicken eggs. On a Monday morning the eggs started to hatch, taking up to 3 days for the last chick to crack its shell. Some lucky students were actually able to see a baby chick emerging from its shell. Once the chicks were 4 days old, we let the students come into the science foyer and interact with the chicks. Now we have a clutch of very tame, bigger chicks that have been moved to a safe and secure environment on a staff members farm with their parents.











FRUIT CAKE MINING

Ms Corrs Yr 8 science class enjoyed a fun experiment based on the Fruitcake Mining activity that simulates mining extraction of minerals with different values and provides an insight into the potential environmental impact of mining. Instead of Fruitcake we used Agar gel and various sized materials placed in different layers. The students had to think of this as a core sample and try to remove the materials from within the Agar with as minimal damage to the environment as possible.


