# **Noongar seasons**

First summer December- January	Birak Hot and dry	Red symbolises heat, sun and fire.  During this time, Noongar people used controlled burning to hunt kangaroo and wallaby. When the fire drive animals from bush lands, it was easier for hunters to spear their prey. Kangaroo, still eaten today, is a healthy food source for Noongar and non-Noongar people.	
Second summer February-March	Bunuru Hot easterly winds	Orange symbolises abundance of fishing and lack of rain.  At this time Noongar families camped near the coast and river inlets where fishing provided a good food source.	
<b>Autumn</b> April-May	<b>Djeran</b> Cooler weather	Light green symbolises cooler weather and eucalyptus trees. Families moved further inland along the Swan River where they continued to fish. They also collected bulbs and seeds to eat.  Dark blue symbolises rain and cold weather.  Winds turn westerly, becoming very cold. Noongar people moved inland away from the coast. For food they captured moulting swans (losing their feathers) and fat, juicy bardi grubs that live in grass trees. To keep warm and dry they work booka (kangaroo skin coats) and built mia mia (huts) for shelter.	
<b>Winter</b> June-July	Makuru Cold and wet		
First spring August- September	<b>Djilba</b> Cold and rain decreasing	Pink (or purple) symbolises growth of wildflowers and plants.  Noongar people dug up native potatoes from beneath wandoo trees. They also hunted emus, kangaroo, bandicoot and possum for food.	
Second spring October-	Kambarang Warm and rain decreasing	Yellow symbolises return of hot weather.  Families move back towards the coast as weather warms up, where they enjoy waterfowl, birds eggs, pigeons, frogs, freshwater crayfish and turtles as part of their diet at this time.

# YR11 PERTH ZOO EXCURSION

It was a rude wake up call at some 'ungodly' hour on Monday morning of 25<sup>th</sup> February 2019. The bus departed at 7.00am sharp to transport 18 budding biologists and 2 staff members to the Perth Zoo for the day; a journey that was to take 3hours and 30 minutes one way. If one does the calculations, it wouldn't be unreasonable to question such a quest to spend just 4 hours at the zoo.

But it was well worth it. Students enjoyed a one hour presentation on the topic of classification by zoo staff. The workshop was opened with an acknowledgement to the traditional, indigenous land owners upon which Perth Zoo stands today. This was followed by a stimulating lecture which included a close encounter with a handsome specimen of a Tiliqua rugose, a slow moving species of blue-tongued shingleback endemic to W.A. and a notably smaller relative 'The Rottnest Blue Tongue'. A hands-on and interactive classification workshop using various animal skulls, followed by a self-guided walk through the marvellous grounds to learn some biology. Throw in some beautiful Perth weather, a not so mild 36°C and an excellent cohort of students, and the whole experience was an awesome one to be had by all.

Just one last note: We are very fortunate to have such a well designed and well kept Zoo in Western Australia where animal welfare is clearly of the highest priority. A visit comes highly recommended!

We would like to extend a special thank you to Mr. Paul Chamberlain who willingly gave up 13 hours of his time to be our wonderful bus driver.

# BELAYING/ABSEILING/CLIMBING ASSESSMENTS EXCURSION

On Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> February, the Year 11/12 Certificate II in Outdoor

Recreation students travelled to Wilyabrup Sea Cliffs to put abseiling and safety belaying skills developed in class to the test, in a natural and challenging environment. This is essential to provide the students with the opportunity to display abseiling and single rope top-line belaying competencies necessary for course completion.

A series of two climbs and abseils (all with a top-line belay systems where students provide the necessary safety protocols for each other) were rigged and manned by 2 qualified instructors affording the students many opportunities over the course of the day.

Students were required to not just abseil and climb but also to safely attach an abseiler/climber, carry out all safety checks, connect and operate a top-line belay ensuring the safety of the abseiler/climber.

We were blessed with great weather, sunny and light SSE winds, the ocean glassed-off; the conditions could not have been better.

The students displayed very good skills and safety awareness and practices ensuring a rewarding experience for all, both students and instructors.

Special thanks to Mick Dempsey of the Margaret River Climbing Co. for lending us his expertise on the day. We are very fortunate as a school to have been able to draw on his services for many years and look forward to continuing this into the future.





# **Year 9 Roping— Explorus High Ropes Course**

On Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> March, the Semester 1 Year 9 Roping students travelled to Explorus Adventure Learning to undertake an activity on the High Ropes Course.

At Explorus they were given the opportunity to scale and complete the course set across a series of platforms mounted in Karri trees between 9 to 12 metres above the ground, while classmates, previously trained in school-based classes, provided safety belaying for those up in the trees.

The students displayed excellent belay skills and roping communications to ensure a safe and enjoyable environment was fostered.

Special thanks go to Nicky Hanson (Explorus director) and the Explorus team for their professional facilitation and supervision, affording the students involved an exciting and engaging experience.

On route back to school in the afternoon, the group visited an abseil site to familiarise themselves with site safety, site management measures undertaken by DBCA and operating procedures specific to abseil sites. This is particularly relevant, as the students will be undertaking an abseiling excursion at Wilyabrup Sea Cliffs in Term 2.
