






Inspiring the next generation of women in agri-tech







"Currently there is a dearth of women in agriculture, so this project is a Government push to get more women interested in the industry. So as female teachers in agriculture we are role models to encourage girls into agriculture and show them it is a field many women can engage in," Bel said.

After working for 10 years in the Department of Agriculture specialising in entomology and covering areas of South Perth, Geraldton and then Kununurra, Bel retrained as a teacher and moved to Margaret River to take up a post at the high school. Teaching agriculture in a school is what she describes as her "dream job", and her passion is contagious. She confesses she "particularly loves teaching kinds about the wonderful world of insects but also all things agricultural".

Bel teaches years 7-11 in all facets of farming; from growing food through tadeonal methods in soil but also in the environmental benefits of using technology to produce food using aquaponics, hydroponics and aquaculture. The teaching program also includes cattle work, sheep shearing, tending to chickens (and selling the eggs) and viticulture. She is passionate about technology and sustainability which she weaves across all subjects.

"Everything we do as humans relates back to food and fibre, which is why we (in agriculture) do what we do. I teach about plastics, the planet, climate change, penguins, pandas and polar bears! We have to look after our planet and come up with much smarter ways of producing food."

Her CQU project began with the Women in Agri-tech Symposium in Brisbane in February, where participants were exposed to new and emerging agri-tech they can utilise for their learning modules. The group will meet regularly online to support each other and learn from industry experts as they progress through the project, then come together again in November this year for the final symposium.

Bel's background and enthusiasm for bugs led her to base her project around native bee hotels.

"My specific are for the project was geolocation-animals, for which I chose insects. The Department of Agriculture already has an app called My Pest Guide, which is basically citizen science. If you see a weird bug in your garden, you can take a picture, using satellites it gives GPS positioning then it gets sent to the Department. It has proven useful for biosecurity matters, but also to help people identify insects in their garden if they are interested."



Bel has been granted permission to utilise the app as an administrator to track uptake of native bee hotels around the country as her project is rolled out. She hopes that her learning modules will not only introduce school children to the app and help them discover the often unseen world in their own backyards, but also get schools as a whole involved in protecting and nurturing native bee populations.

"We have to recognise the value of insects, and our native bees, of which there are lots, they are mostly solitary, largely stingless – and cute!" Bel said.

"Bees are a precious resource. We are getting to the point where we need to look after nit only our European honeybees, but also recognise the valuable part native bees play in pollination of native flora."

Bel's students will assist by building a collection of bee hotels, which will be distributed to schools in the area with a bar code and instructions on how to track their bee population. She will develop a program consisting of three sixty-minute lessons, including videos aimed at encouraging students to get involved and learn about the importance of native bees in our ecosystem. They will receive instructions on making their own bee hotels, which are very easy to construct with stormwater pipe and bamboo with 3-4mm wide holes. The peak time for native bee activity is between November and April, so Bel is working hard now to have the learning modules and example hotels constructed and distributed before the end of the year.

Once complete, CQU will add the project to their own website along with the other created via the Women in Agri-tech program. This will open u participation from schools right across the country.

The begin with, Bel's project is simply looking at native bee hotel occupation rates and, as she points out, it is only as good as the teachers running it. However, data collected over time from across the country could prove invaluable into the future in terms of creating idea habitats for native bees and helping to naturally boost numbers. For example, if numbers are low in one area, plants known to attract native bees can be added and program participants could then see what impact this has.

In terms of bolstering Bel's leadership as a woman in agriculture, the project has enabled her to really push what she is passionate about – and very good at – and show the girls in her class what wonderful opportunities are available in the world of agriculture and technology.

"I guess I just see myself as a mentor to the girls in my class, especially as I have had a previous role in agriculture," she said.

"This is a great opportunity to build my profile, get out there and take on a new challenge."

Year 11 Certificate II Outdoor Recreation Hiking Expedition

On Tuesday 5th to Thursday 7th November, the Year 11 Cert II Outdoor Recreation students undertook their Hiking/Navigation Assessment Expedition on the Cape to Cape Track. The Expedition covered a total distance of 56km over the 3 days, comprising of Margaret River river mouth to Contos Campground (Day 1), Contos Campground to Hamelin Bay (Day 2) and Hamelin Bay to Cosy Corner Day 3.

The expedition serves as a vital tool to complete a number of assessments ranging from observations of performance with respect to hiking, campcraft, navigation, minimum impact techniques, camp site management and leadership. Prior to the expedition students complete a comprehensive navigation plan and personal expedition planner.

In pairs and individually, the students took turns at leading the group in navigation stages over the three days. This involved giving the group a navigation briefing, navigating and leading the group, staying aware of group spread, well-being, hydration and other needs.

It must be remembered that at all times students had a backpack (~15kg) on their back containing all their food, cooking equipment, clothes, sleeping bag, fluids, personal needs etc, everything required to survive the three days. The weather gods obliged with mild weather and good cloud cover without a single drop of rain.

Overall the group put in an excellent performance, remaining positive and focussed even in times of duress. The group dynamic and self-management displayed was of a high standard.

MRSHS Students Compete in Karate Championships, Japan

Two Margaret River Senior High School Students and a senior fighter from the Margaret River Karate Club recently returned home after an exhilarating 10-day journey to Japan, where they competed at the 21th annual USKU Universal Shotokan Karate Championships in Takanabe on October 18-20, 2019. High school students Zebediah Barnett, 16 and Zane McKee, 17 together with former high school graduate Danielle Campbell, 18 were selected to represent their dojo and Western Australia to compete at the biennial event.

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Although the trio competed exceptionally well during their kata and kumite events, they were outclassed by the exceptional strength of their competitors. Almost 150 karateka from 11 countries, along with more than 200 Japanese competitors travelled to the small

town of Takanabe on the coast in northern Miyazaki Prefecture on the island of Kyushu compete against some of

the world's best fighters. With so many competitors taking part, makes it that much harder for everyone. And that's not to mention the actual draw can also be a major factor in determining the outcome.

Sensei Ken Rouw, who accompanied the trio said he was pleased with their efforts. "They were up against a tough field this time – but they did their best, which is all I can ask of them," he said on reflection.

One of the trip's highlights was a special moment Zebediah Barnett will never forget. After almost a decade of sweat and toil, he was awarded his 1st Dan Black Belt following a grading examination, by Universal Shotokan Karate Union's Director, Kenichi Fukamizu. "Receiving my black belt in Japan was



special, and it will become a memory I will cherish for all time," Barnett said. "You could say this is just a pit-stop on my long and winding karate journey," he said, "and I plan to continue with my training to develop new skills, and perhaps inspire and pass on those skills to new students at the beginning of their karate journey. "This has

been my third time to Japan and because of this I feel I have learned a lot more about Shotokan karate and Japanese culture in a way not many people my age gets to experience."

As for students Danielle Campbell and Zane McKee, their first trip to the Land of the Rising Sun, the opportunity of competing on the international stage and in the birthplace of karate, was a valuable learning occasion and will become a positive memory for them. "This tournament will be a cherished memory for me," Campbell said. "I knew going into it that the Japanese would be tough competition



and although I didn't have much success, I felt proud to represent our club and the Australian team.

"Just watching the athletes was amazing and it gives me the drive to continue my journey to one day be as good as they were," she said. "Overall my highlight of Japan was not only the competition experience, but the people. They are the nicest people I have ever met, so friendly and polite, and always had a smile on their face.

"I would go back in a heartbeat." Zane McKee was also in awe of everything he experienced. "I thought the tournament was extremely well organised and I really enjoyed the atmosphere and watching all the super experienced people competing in Kumite as well as the sharp, precise katas," he said. "My highlight would have to be when we visited the burial ground for the 47 Ronin at the temple of Sengakuji in Tokyo – when a group of leaderless Samurai who commit seppuku (ceremonial suicide) and the story about why they had to avenge the death of their master".

Resilience is one of those skills that all kids need and should have. It refers to their ability to cope and adapt in situations when confronted with challenges such as adversity, trauma, tragedy, or even stress. 
