Margaret River Senior High School Students Take Part in 2015 Australian Geography Competition

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Students from Year 8 are taking part in the 21st annual Australian Geography Competition this week.

Approximately 75,000 students from all around Australia have entered the Competition, which is organised by the Australian Geography Teachers' Association and the Royal Geographical Society of Queensland (RGSQ).

RGSQ Competition coordinator Bernard Fitzpatrick said that the Competition gave teachers an opportunity to highlight geography in their schools.

"Geography is a vital subject that all young people should study," said Mr Fitzpatrick. "It helps students understand the world around them, and how people and environments are interconnected."


"With schools in many parts of Australia implementing the new national geography curriculum this year, it's an exciting time to be involved in geographical education and the Competition plays its part in this," said Mr Fitzpatrick.

Students who excel in the Australian competition have the chance to represent Australia in the International Geography Olympiad.

Two senior students from Western Australia will be selected to take part in Geography's Big Week Out in South East Queensland later this year. From that event, Australia's team will be chosen for the 2016 International Geography Olympiad in Beijing, China.

STUDENT COUNCIL

During Term 1 the Student Council was finalised. It consists of 25 members and represents the student body. The election process has three stages to ensure the most capable as well as the most accepted students represent their year group. The students had to write a nomination form and were invited to a merit-selection interview conducted by older student councillors. Finally, a popular election determined the overall winners.

Next term, the students will focus on meeting and planning skills, representation skills and debating. In addition, the Year 9 & 10 councillors will participate in mediation to resolve conflicts (SCRaM) and political debating (Evatt Trophy competition).

Congratulations to Kate Thompson, Yr 10 student councillor, who was accepted into the Sir Charles Court Leadership program at Curtin University and Bella McTaggart who succeeded in achieving a place in the state final of the Youth of the Year competition. The students demonstrated a wide range of roping skills including climbing, abseiling, belaying and the care of roping equipment.


Swimming Carnival

Over the past 8 weeks the Phys Ed Dept has completed the swimming programme which started with the Yr7 swimming lessons, followed by the MRSHS School

Swimming Carnival and culminating with the South west Inter-School Swimming Carnival at the South West Sports Centre in Bunbury.

The students did a couple of trainings during the week prior to the carnival and were surprised by a special guest, **Shane Gould**, an Australian Olympic swimming champion who won 5 individual medals (3 gold, 1 silver and 1 Bronze) at the 1972 Munich Olympics when she was only 15yrs old. She is the only swimmer in history to hold all freestyle world records for 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m and 200m Individual Medley at the same time. Thank you Shane for giving up your time to pass on some valuable racing tips to our young swimmers.

A big thank you to all the students who attended. Your participation, energy and commitment were amazing and you did your school proud. All students showed great sportsmanship with staff receiving many positive comments about the conduct of the students throughout the day.



ZIP ZAP ZOOM



HAINING TEACHERS VISIT MARGARET RIVER

In 2014 two Margaret River SHS teachers, Angela McCoy and Martin Keen, were able to visit China thanks to support from the Augusta-Margaret River Shire, in pursuance of furthering the Sister City and Sister School relationship we have with Haining. That visit paved the way for a group of Margaret River students to visit China later this year, planning for which is well under way and 14 students look like getting the experience of a lifetime come October.

Last week Margaret River Senior High School was able to respond in kind to the wonderful hospitality shown to us while in China by hosting a reply visit by two teachers from Haining Number 1 High School, a precursor to a similar student exchange by Chinese students next year. While here Mr Zhigang Cha (Deputy Principal and Academic Director) and Ms Wanjiong Wu (Director of Senior Grade

Two and English Teacher) visited a wide range of venues in the Margaret River region to help plan an exciting visit by their students next year, including the Sunflower Animal Farm, the Chocolate Factory, Candy Cow and Amazen. Our visitors also participated in a series of meetings with Principal Andrew Host and members of the Senior Leadership Team of Margaret River SHS over a three day period to exchange information on our respective educational systems and share ideas for future cooperative activities.





In addition to experiencing teaching/learning environments Margaret River style by visiting a number of classrooms over a range of faculty areas Mr Cha and Ms Wu were particularly taken by a visit to the Rivermouth to watch Mr Cameron and the Surf Academy Students show the skills that have made them the number one school surfing team in Australia several times. Despite resisting all efforts to get them into wetsuits and onto a board, both acknowledged that the chance to do so would be a highlight for the Chinese students and a

certain selling point for future visits.

We look forward to our student trip to Haining in September/October and now equally to welcoming students from Haining to our region in the near future.
